

Endangered Green Sea Turtle Survives Boat Strike to be Released Wednesday Clearwater Marine Aquarium Removes Tumors and Treats Boat Strike Wounds

Clearwater, FL (Oct. 31, 2017) - Clearwater Marine Aquarium (CMA) will release endangered green sea turtle Apple Jacks on Wed., Nov. 1 at Honeymoon Island State Park. Apple Jacks is an 82-pound sub-adult sea turtle that was rescued in February this year in Lee County. The turtle had a large wound on the carapace, believed to be caused by a boat strike, as well as fibropapilloma tumors. These cauliflower-like tumors on the soft tissue of the sea turtle's body are caused by a virus called fibropapillomatosis.

On Feb. 28 Apple Jacks was picked up and brought to the Center for Rehabilitation of Wildlife (CROW) in Sanibel, FL. On March 1, the sea turtle was transferred to CMA for triage and subsequent rehabilitation. Rehabilitation included receiving vitamins, antibiotics, iron, and fluids, caring for the wound on the sea turtle's carapace as well as removing the fibropapilloma tumors. The cause of fibropapillomatosis is still unknown, but you can help prevent boat strikes to turtles by following all speed regulations while boating, and by having a designated person looking for wildlife in the path of the boat.

Apple Jacks will be placed in the water at Honeymoon Island State Park's Ranger Station on Wed., Nov. 1 at 11 a.m.
